Plant Selection by Board President, Jack Wigal

<u>Reference</u>: Landscape plants for the Arizona desert, AMWUA Regional Water Conservation Committee

As you plan your landscaping needs, select and group plants with similar water needs to create a landscape that is easier to maintain and is more water efficient. Visit <u>http://www.amwva.org/</u> for help with plant selection. Also be sure to check with the HOA's CC&R's and to determine if there are any plant restrictions.

The seven principles of Xeriscaping are:

- 1-Good landscape planning and design;
- 2- Low water use plants;
- 3- Appropriate turf areas;
- 4-Efficient irrigation;
- 5-Soil improvements;
- 6–Use of mulches;
- 7—Appropriate maintenance;

Landscape plants for Arizona desert (low water use plants) include:

## Small trees

- Palo Blanco-full sun-low water-low litter-no thorns;

- Iron wood-full sun-low water-evergreen-low litter-does have thorns;

- Kidney wood-full sun to partial shade-semi evergreen-low litter-shrub or small tree-no thorn-

- Chaste tree-full sun to partial shade-moderate water-deciduous-moderate litter-no thorns; -

- Desert Willow-full sun-low water-fast growingdeciduous-seasonal litter-no thorns-beautiful flowers;

- Leather-leaf Acacia-sun-low water-evergreenlow litter-good for small spaces or containers

# <u>Small palms</u>

- Pygmy Date Palms-slow growing-clump forming-needs covering if frost is expected-prefers shade to semi shade;

- Mexican Blue Palm-full sun-moderate waterhardy to 15 degrees-slow growing-low litterthorns-well suited to containers;

- Canary Island Date Palm-part to full sun-water moderate to ample-can be damaged at 20 degrees F-periodic grooming necessary

## <u>Scrubs</u>

- Red Bird of Paradise-full sun-hardy to 30 degrees-deciduous-flower late spring to fall-low litter-prickly stems;

- Mexican Bird of Paradise-full sun-moderate water-evergreen-yellow spikes-moderate litterattracts hummingbirds;

- Desert Milkweed- low water usage-low litter;

- Bear grass-very low water-low litter-3 feet x 4 feet-no thorns

## Agave and succulents

- Agave Attenuate-does not die after bloomingmoderate water

- Desert Spoon-low water-low litter

- Giant Hesperaloe-very low water-low littergrows 5 feet x 5 feet

- Red Yucca-low water-evergreen--low litter-no thorns-tolerates tuff conditions

-Medicinal Aloe-low water-evergreen-yellow blossoms-low litter

# <u>Perennials</u>

- Globe Mallow-very low water-evergreen-low litter-no thorns

- Rain Lilly-full sun-evergreen-low litter-no thorns

- Chaparral Sage-full sun to semi shadeevergreen-blue flowers-low litter

- Autumn Sage-evergreen-red, pink, or white flowers-spring and fall-attracts hummingbirds

"Water, water everywhere" ... Did you know that the EPA standards for tap water are actually higher and more enforceable than the FDA standards for bottled water? Yes, that's right — tap water is held to higher standards and is more regulated than bottled water.

Bottled water costs more than 1,900 times as much as tap water to produce. Don't like the taste of your tap water? Try buying a filter for your faucet; it's still cheaper than buying bottled water (check out GreenerChoices.org and NRDC.org/water/drinking/ gfilters.asp). And, about that plastic bottle that the bottled water came in – about 75% of all plastic water bottles end up in a landfill. It takes more than 1,000 YEARS to biodegrade one PET #1 plastic water bottle. Reports are starting to surface that even the PET #1 bottles leach hormone-disrupting phthalates into their contents. Check out the EWG.org website for some interesting tidbits on their water study report. What can you do? Stop buying bottled water; it's that simple. You CAN make a difference if you remember to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle!
